The escalation of the international armed conflict in Ukraine has caused civilian casualties and destruction of civilian infrastructure, forcing people to flee their homes seeking safety, protection and assistance. Millions of refugees from Ukraine have crossed borders into neighbouring countries, and many more have been forced to move inside the country. They are in need of protection and support. In light of the emergency and the scale of humanitarian needs, an inter-agency regional refugee response is being carried out, in support of the efforts of refugee-hosting countries. The Regional Refugee Response Plan brings together UN, NGO and other relevant partners and focuses on supporting host country governments to ensure safe access to territory for refugees and third-country nationals fleeing from Ukraine, in line with international standards. It also prioritizes the provision of critical protection services and humanitarian assistance.

Unprecedented numbers (23 August 2022)

Over 6.6 million refugees recorded.

Russian Federation (2,197,679)**, Poland (1,274,130), Germany (670,000), Czech Republic (412,959), Italy (150,261), Türkiye (145,000), Spain (133,820), Bulgaria (129,437), UK (111,900), France (96,520), Moldova (89,649), Romania (84,662).

Points to important onward movement. Number of Temporary Protection applications points to stabilization.


90% women and children (of school age).

Key figures

- 1,274,130 PESEL registrations of Ukrainians (residency / population register) 8 August 2022
- Compulsory education age bracket 7-18 years.
- 544,396 PESEL registrations aged 0-17 years old.
- Excluding 0-4 year olds: 435,001 PESEL registrations
- Number of enrolments primary + secondary: 182,245 27 June 2022

Rough estimate - only 40 - 43 % of children of compulsory age were enrolled in Polish schools in June.



Enrolment (Poland)

Forecast

Polish Government estimates 700,000 - 800,000 Ukrainian children in country.

If 200,000 enrol, expectation is that 500,000 - 600,000 will remain in Ukrainian on-line learning.

Minister Czarnek stated that an additional 200,000 Ukrainian children can be enrolled in September.
